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



#### MODULE SETUP

Some notes on setup. It has been awhile since I visited this topic, so I will toss it out for what it is worth. Sometimes we get half-way done and find that the adjustment left in the legs isn't enough to compensate either way. As we all know, not every module is perfectly flat from end to end. However, the variations on each module are small in the overall scheme of things. Thus if we use the bascule gate module at the fixed 40 inch height to the top of the rail it becomes a benchmark. We can work both ways from the benchmark. Match the height of the adjacent module to the benchmark and then level the other end with it. Since we say the modules aren't flat, don't just set the level in the middle and use it. The best way is to have a four foot or longer level with a block on each end. The level will span the module so that the ends will be level without regard to the middle of the module. Using sight and feel, set the end of the next module even with the end of the previous and level it the same way. With due care, the two ends of the layout will be even when they come together. Obviously, the corners and eight foot modules would require longer straight edges to span the distance from end to end. The point is that we don't care about "level" except as it relates to the ends of each module. On the corners where scenery stands above the track, the level may require thicker shims. This is no problem as long as the shims are both the same thickness.


Another item is joiner tracks. Once the modules are setup and leveled, we need to install the joiner tracks between them. Each module owner is supposed to provide any tracks for their internal interfaces and three 9" tracks to connect their module to the next on the right. Owners' tracks should have their names on them. The module group has a box of joiner tracks and rerailers to use for the corners and bridges and in those cases where the track gap is not the prescribed 9". A module that doesn't have the prescribed 4.5" gap at each end needs to be modified or the owner needs to provide appropriate joiner tracks.


In order for the joiner tracks to slip easily into the gaps, the rail joiners must slide on far enough to be flush with the end of the rail on at least one end. The other end may slide flush or not. With the joiners extended on one end, it can be mated with the module rails. The track then drops in the gap and the joiners are extended on the other end. A rail gap up to 1/8", which can be split between each end of the joiner track, is generally acceptable. Any module which consistently won't accept a 9" joiner needs to be fixed. Make sure the rail joiners are snug on the rails. The power for the joiner tracks relies on these connections. Loose joiners may result in dead spots on the layout. (FYI: new rail joiners have a small tab on each end. These tabs should be removed before use to shorten the joiner and keep them from bending in the way of a good connection.) If a joiner doesn't slide easily, something is wrong. Don't force it. Take the track out and find the problem.

Our module setups can go smoothly if everyone is on the same page.

#### Gunnison Division Notes Chalk Creek

Hello Pikes Peak Division! Scenery work continues. It looks a lot nicer than plywood, and I like having scenery catch derailed rolling stock vs. having the floor break their fall! This time I describe my first major water project – Chalk Creek and the surrounding scenery. The real Chalk Creek meanders west of Nathrop (south of Buena Vista) through Chaffee County, CO, in the east end of the South Park Line's Gunnison District. My Chalk Creek is more on the west end of the district. The fishing and scenery is just as good!

Because I did not want to possibly have to rip out a crappy job, I followed along step-bystep using Mastering Model Railroading Scenery – Volume 2, "*Rivers, Rapids, & Rushing Water*" by Cameron Bryars. "The book" was a big help. The whole project took about a week and a half, with the majority of that being drying time between steps.

The first photo shows about 80% of the unfinished creek running down the middle of the photo, flowing from the sky-blue wall at the top to the photo bottom where the creek goes (can't see in the picture) under a future bridge, through a future fascia, and into the isle. The whole creek is about four feet long.

So far the creek bottom is brush painted per "the book," with charcoal and umbers in the middle and tans along the edges. After the paint dries the entire creek is brushed heavily with white glue as a sort-of sealer. The last thing you want is for your creek pour to find a small hole and end up on the floor, or worse – all over hidden track under the creek.

Next is to secure the scenery material to the creek banks, as shown in photo 2. This was mostly dirt and rock, but there's also deadfall, shrubs, weeds, and bodies (fly fisherman, of course).

"Aha!" moment step number one: I used larger rocks (and caulk) to create rapids that divide the creek into five sections (a sixth section flows under that future bridge and into the isle). Because the creek bottom is not perfectly level from end to end, pouring the entire thing at once would have been a pain. Divided, the water in each section can settle at a slightly different level that nobody notices. I wouldn't have thought of dividing the creek into more manageable sections without "the book."

Photo 3 shows the caulk rapids formed around the larger rocks dividing the creek and around other random rock/debris/bodies glued to the creek bed. The caulk is teased in the direction of water flow and left to dry. I did not make my caulk rapids high enough, and after pouring the epoxy resin, about 98% percent of my caulk work was "underwater" – kind of a waste of time and caulk. So I decided to just wait until all of the epoxy is poured and hardened, see what is still sticking out above the surface, and then simply form the caulk on top to achieve the rapids effect.

The next photo (4) shows the creek after two "water" pours – one with no color added and the second with a few drops of light green paint mixed in to tint the epoxy. Tinting the epoxy is my second "aha!" moment step, adding to the realism significantly.

I used the two-part EnviroTex Lite epoxy resin with hardener found at Michaels and Hobby Lobby. "The book" recommends purchasing the gallon size – I looked hard for it and am glad I never found it. The epoxy is not inexpensive, and I could probably model a Great Lake in N scale with the smaller size I bought. Especially once I realized a creek does not need to be as deep as a real mountain creek, but just has to appear like it is. Very thin layers can do the trick!

Shoreline trees, rip-rap, brush, and shrubs are shown in photo 5. My third "aha!" moment step is also shown in the picture: drybrushing titanium white paint along the tails of the rapids, the banks, and in front of, over, and around other debris in the creek. The white paint really makes the direction of water flow "pop." It was hard to not go crazy with it. Freshly hardened resin is like a mirror, so the water also got random Mod Podge streaks to knock-down the glare, clarity, and perfectly flat surface.

Photo 6 is another shot looking upstream from just where this water project ends. Two fishermen are "matching the hatch" and reeling in keepers. Now to work on that bridge and fascia to complete Chalk Creek.





#### **Pikemasters Model Railroad Club**



The pikemasters model railroad club is a group of hobbyists dedicated to representing American railroad history using 1:87 "ho" scale-model trains

Our layout encompasses 25x90 feet of space in the basement of the Colorado Springs city auditorium. We occupy the former CSPD pistol range on the western side of the basement. The layout features both standard gauge HO models and HOn3 narrow gauge models that represent the 3 foot narrow gauge railroads that were common in Colorado during the late 19th century. Our layout uses both analog DC control, and Digital DCC control, with engines that have onboard processors that only respond to instructions sent directly to them.

In addition to our open houses, we have club meetings every Thursday night at 7pm. visitors are welcome to come to the auditorium on Thursday nights to view the layout.




We're located at the corner of Kiowa and Weber, entrances to the alley around the auditorium are available from both directions on Weber and Eastbound on Kiowa. Our parking lot is shared both with the auditorium upstairs, and the rock climbing place across the lot, so more than likely the alley parking will all be taken. After 6 PM, all the meters in downtown are free, and there is usually parking out on the street, if that fills up, there are almost always parking spots in front of the Century Link building at Pikes Peak and Weber. Our entrance is on the West side of the city auditorium next to the bike rack at the alley entrance. We will probably have these doors unlocked, however on the off chance that we cannot have them unlocked, a number to call to be let in is 719-217-1009. 
