December Wavy Rails

On a previous issue after the Cheyenne train show, Kristin and I showed a picture of Wyoming's Merci Car (shown at end of article). Unlike Colorado, they preserved their car which is on display.



Last summer, after dropping off my daughter and son-in-law at the Amtrak station in La Junta at O Dark Thirty, we stopped at a library and came across an incredible display. Hidden and forgotten in a basement storage room was a collection of the gifts that were originally sent in the long lost Colorado car.



The 1947 U.S. Friendship Train collected foodstuffs from American donors for transport to the people of France and Italy. Contemporaneous with the Marshall Plan, it provided desperately needed assistance in the aftermath of World War II, but was primarily a token gesture of goodwill, with stops across the U.S. ending at New York City, where it was received with a ticker tape parade prior to shipment to Europe.

boxcars arrived in Europe, and the train rolled through the countries distributing relief aid.

In response, a French railroad worker, André Picard, initiated the Merci (or Gratitude) Train as a way of thanking American citizens for their generosity. The boxcars used for this response effort were called "40 and 8s." During World War I, they were used to transport troops and animals and were capable of carrying up to forty servicemen or eight horses.

The citizens of France filled forty-nine of these boxcars, one for each of the forty-eight states and one which was divided equally between the territory of Hawaii and Washington, D.C., with a wide array of gifts. These included books, ashtrays, vases, bridal gowns, dolls, children's drawings, pictures, original manuscripts and musical compositions, and other items. After landing in New York, the train made stops in each state leaving a boxcar of gifts. These

were then dispersed to libraries and other state facilities.

The Ski Train

Are you looking for any fun holiday plans this year? How about getting out and enjoying the nice and relaxing trip to Winter Park and back on the Ski Train. Even if you're not a skier or snowboarder, there are still plenty of things to do there. A few years ago, Amber and I took our family on the ski train and enjoyed festivities around the resort. Later that afternoon, we rode the train back to Denver's Union Station. So how did all that start? Let me tell you.

For most of the 20th century, the Rio Grande Ski Train was an excursion that carried skiers, day-trippers, and rail enthusiasts from Denver to the slopes of Winter Park. Over the years the Ski Train became a part of the culture, blending the Rocky Mountain scenery with the romance of classic passenger rail service.

The Ski Train began in 1940, when the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad (D&RGW) started taking passengers between Denver and the newly developed Winter Park ski area. Since the railroad already operated the Moffat Tunnel route, which cut through the Continental Divide, it was able to provide direct access to the high-country and ski resort town of Winter Park. Recognizing an opportunity to promote both rail travel and recreation, the D&RGW introduced weekend ski excursions that dropped passengers at a platform just steps from the lifts.

Throughout the 1940s and 1950s, the Ski Train grew in popularity. In the beginning the D&RGW used heavyweight coaches pulled by steam locomotives. Then after steam was retired, the train was pulled by Rio Grande's distinctive black-and-gold diesel engines. During those days the train became known for its reliability, even during harsh winter conditions that frequently closed Colorado Interstate I-70.

Through the years the Ski Train retained a more relaxed, excursion-style atmosphere where passengers played cards, socialized, and watched the snow-capped mountains unfold through right outside the window.

In 1988, local businessman and philanthropist Philip Anschutz purchased the service and modernized the train with refurbished Tempo cars, sourced from the VIA railroad in Canada. Now under private ownership, the train continued to run most weekends each winter, and the train was even occasionally used for special occasions during the summer and fall.



Unfortunately, the original Ski Train ceased operations in 2009 due to rising costs of insurance, maintenance and logistical challenges. However, in 2017, Amtrak revived the concept with the “Winter Park Express”. And whether you are or are not a fan of Amtrak, at least the line continues to operate, and a Colorado tradition continues.



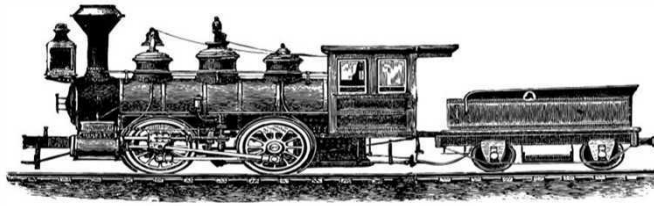
Show and Tell: What I Got For Christmas

The regular monthly meeting was called to order by Superintendent, Mark Fuerstenberger at 7:01 in the community room of the Sand Creek Police Station. There were 19 members present and two visitors. Bill Hime is looking to get back into the railroad model hobby and John Kenney, a long-time railroader who recently came to Colorado.

Secretary Report

The minutes of the October meeting were accepted as published.

Treasurers Report

Tony had hard copies of the treasurer report. The statement reflected the interest payment and drawing receipts. The statement was accepted as presented. Tony also reported that we had received some donations for the Division Christmas presents and hoped for more.

Announcements

Mark went over the plans for the Christmas party in December. There will be two separate exchanges. One for the traditional railroad themed gifts. And the other for less rail focused for ladies themed gifts. Everyone is free to participate in either or both of the exchanges. It was decided that the Division would *not* provide an extra cake for the potluck. Those who would like to are encouraged to bring a potluck or holiday treat items to share. Plates, service and drinks will be provided. Kristin and Charlotte agreed to again wrap the PPD gifts.

Mark also mentioned that everyone should check their membership to ensure it is still current. Many NMRA benefits depend on 100% membership.

Mark asked for nominations for officers in 2026. Tony indicated the willingness to continue as treasurer. John said he would welcome a volunteer for secretary or continue if no one steps up. Mark and Elizabeth would step aside or continue in their positions. Volunteers and nominations may be sent to Mark or brought up at the December meeting.

Elizabeth has an open schedule for members to volunteer to do a program based on their knowledge or expertise.

Mark noted that there are openings for the Rocky Mountain Region Board of directors. RMR vice president and secretary are also available.

Mark reminded everyone of:

- Rocky Mountain Train Show - Holiday 2025 November 29-30 at the Ranch Events Complex in Loveland.
- Rocks & Rails Mineral, Gem, & Model Train Show/Expo December 12-14 at the Boulder County Fairgrounds in Longmont.

It was noted the next RMR convention is scheduled for South Dakota on May 13-16, 2026. Several members indicated the intent to attend.

New Business

Elizabeth announced that TECO is planning a show at the Norris Penrose Event Center for February 28-March 1, 2026. The newly acquired 501C3 status was key to getting an affordable rate for the venue. More details will be announced as they become available. Volunteers are needed for a variety of jobs, from ticket sellers to Seek and Find managers. Presenters for informative talks and clinics are also needed. Please tell Elizabeth how you would like to help.

Show and Tell

Tony Pawlicki discussed the differences between two Athearn wreck cranes in his collection. One was from the early 1950s and was made of cast metal, weighing 17oz and having metal three axle sprung trucks. The other was from much later (perhaps 1960s/70s). It was made of cast plastic with solid three axle plastic trucks. It weighed 7oz. Both were models of the same prototype car.

Charles Marchbanks told of a Front Range kit for four container carriers he acquired, expecting to assemble them. He found that they had been assembled, but not very well. The trucks were tight and the wheels didn't roll well. He spent a lot of time disassembling them and tweaking the parts to significantly improve their performance.

Mike Murdock had a series of google images discussing the pending removal of the old ATSF railroad bridge over Costilla Street in Colorado Springs.

Program

Ken Rambo gave a review of his collection of vintage railroad models. He spoke of how he got involved in buying, selling and collecting trains. He discussed the history of the Athearn company which began in 1943 and lasted through the acquisition by Horizon Hobby's in 2004. They started by offering a metal O scale boxcar in 1943 and added HO models in 1947. He followed the addition of various car types of plastic as a modelling material. After 1963, they adhered to the NMRA standards for all new releases. He displayed many examples of Athearn products along with some Varney and other lesser-known vintage manufacturers. Mike Maline was the winner of a vintage metal boxcar.

Charles Marchbanks name was drawn for the right to buy the donated Norfolk& Western 2-8-8-2 locomotive from the Division.

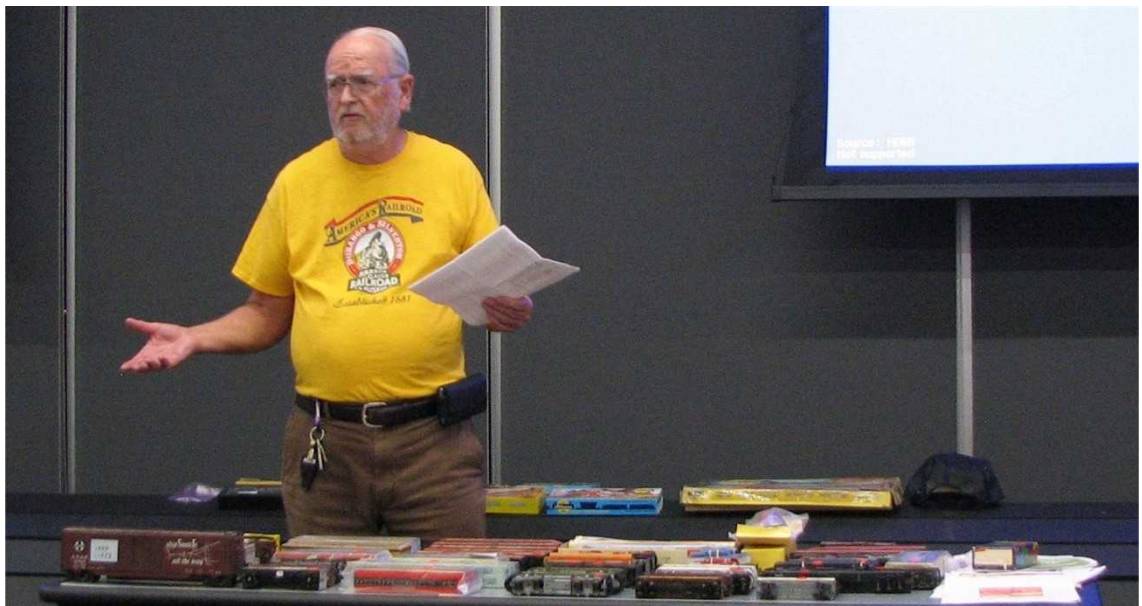
Contest

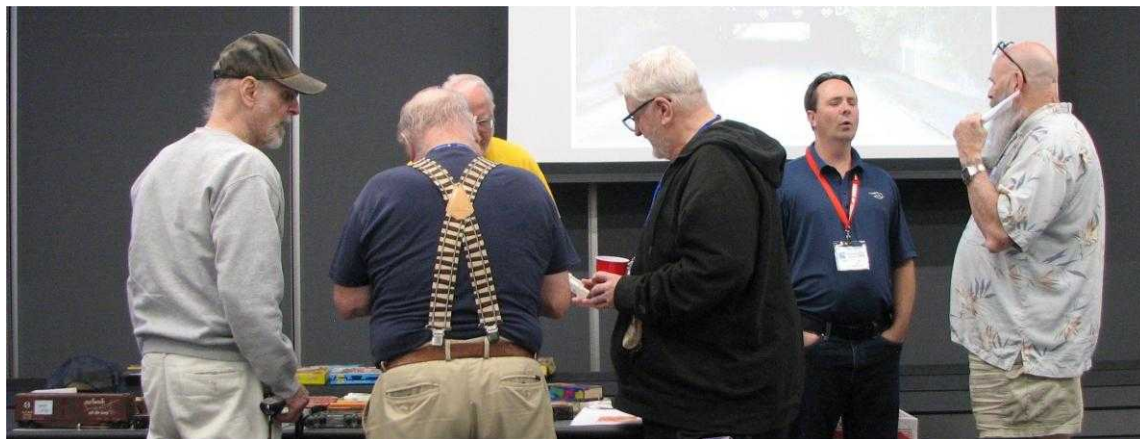
HO SCALE GP38-2 DIESEL LOCOMOTIVE

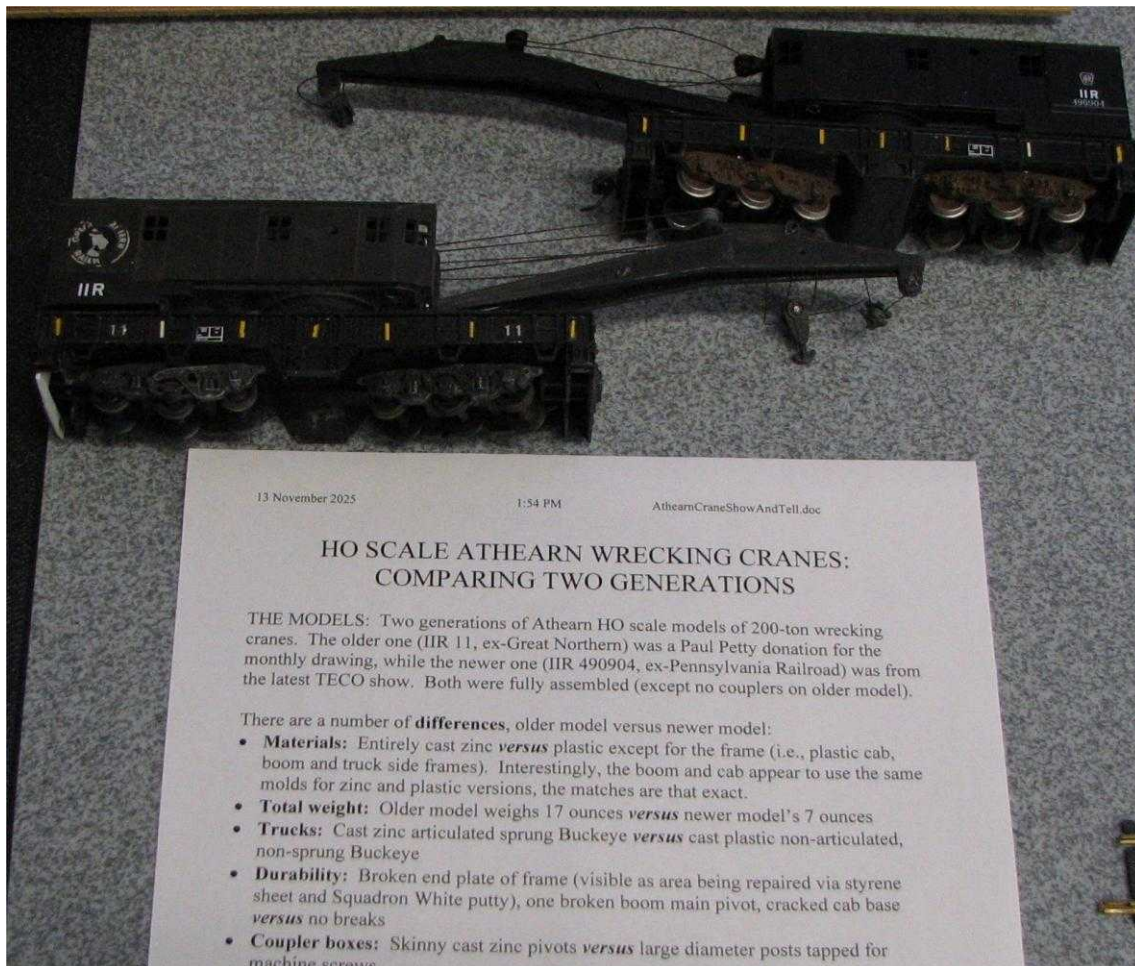
THE LOCOMOTIVE: A heavily modified Athearn HO scale model of GP38-2 diesel locomotive ATSF 3571. Significant changes (several major, many minor) were needed to match the prototype, an ex-TP&W locomotive (per Santa Fe Motive Power, by Joe McMillan, 1985, pages 18-21); visually, the most dramatic features are:

- **No dynamic brakes** (flat-land railroading on the Toledo, Peoria and Western had no need for dynamic brakes; stock model erroneously had dynamic brakes)
- **Angle-sided air filter box** (stock model erroneously had square-sided air filter box)
- **Snow plow** (stock model lacked snow plow)
- **Number of brake cylinders** (model had one per truck side, prototype had two)

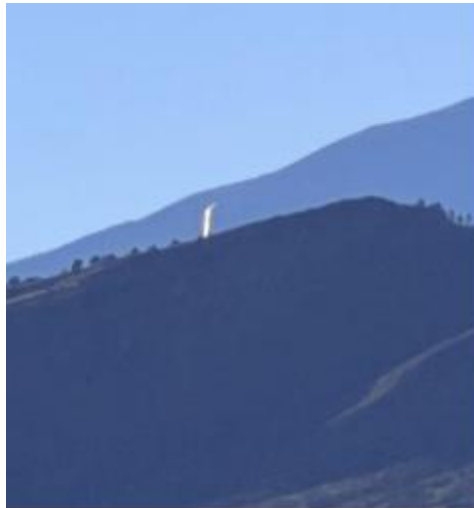

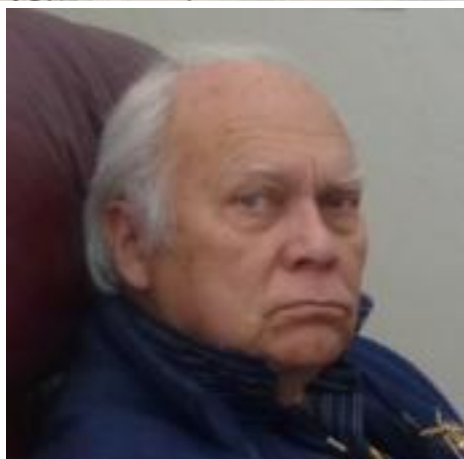

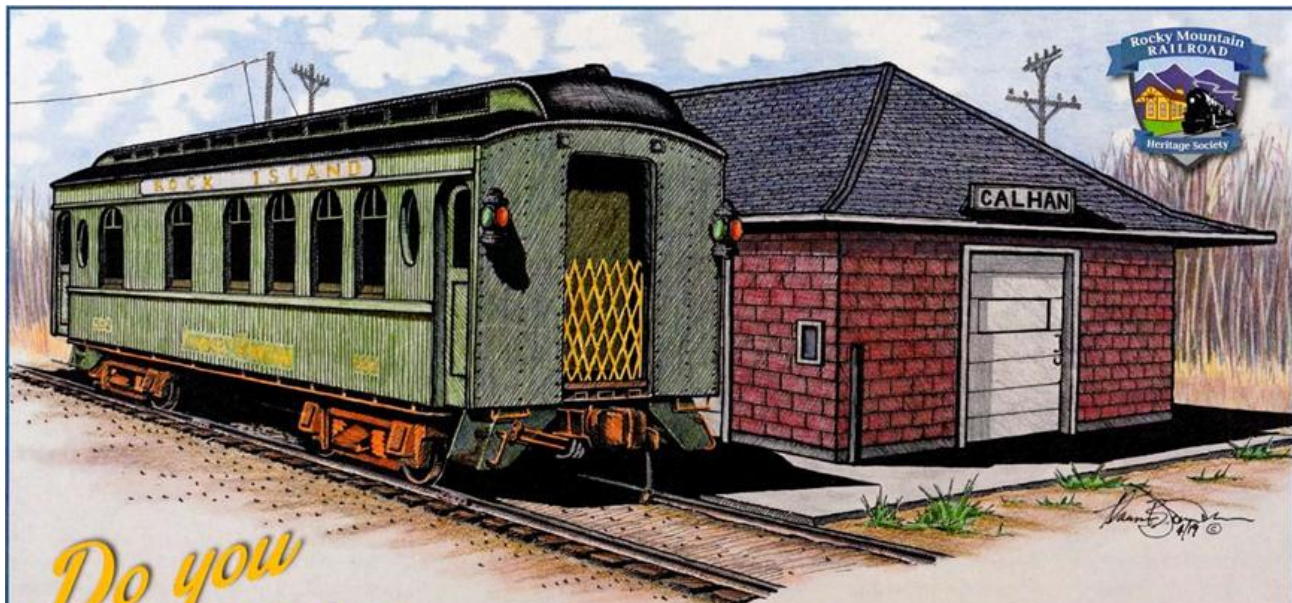
