

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OCTOBER 2015 MEETING MINUTES

The last meeting was on Friday, October 9th, 2015.

The meeting was called to order by Superintendent, Wade Mountz, on Friday, October 9th, 2015, at the Sand Creek Police Station, 4125 Center Park Drive (southeast of the intersection of Fountain and Academy), Colorado Springs, Colorado, at 7:04 PM. There were no new visitors.

The minutes for the September 2015 meeting were approved as written in *The Milepost*.

Frank Pareso gave the Treasurer's report. Frank also receive a letter from an organization called, Life Without Lupus. This organization is asking if our group could set-up a model railroad display on December 5th and 6th, of this year at an event they are having. Frank had already talked to John Emmot — John said this could be a problem because the module group is already obligated for setup at the TECO show during those dates. It was decided that we would have to tell this organization we would have to pass on this opportunity.

Frank brought a second item up. He would like some type of gift of some kind be given to Mike Maline, and his staff, for their hosting a tour of the Fort Carson Army Base Railroad for our group (back on Saturday, September 26th, 2015). Wade thanked Mike and there was a round of applause. Frank made a motion to thank Mike and his staff each receive at least a \$20.00 gift certificate (card). Kristin asked that this be at least \$25.00. Frank asked Mike to let him know what kind of gift certificate (card) each person would want — Mike will let Frank know. The motion passed.

There was no old business to be resolved.

Wade reported that Jerry Bonds, the Contest Chairman will be moving out of town soon. Wade will be looking for a replacement chairperson for this position. Wade described what duties this position includes. Please let Wade know if you are interested in this position.

Gerry Drewes gave an update on the Youth In Model Railroading clinic. Next event is October 17th, 2015 (see flier in the Inserts Section [there is also an event on November 21th, 2015]). Gerry is always looking for volunteers to help out.

Gerry and John may be looking for modules for a 21-day set-up at the Fine Arts Center in December.

Dusty Thompson gave a final update on the upcoming division train show for October 17, 2015. Set-up will be the Friday before at 6:30pm. Vendor spots are full with 33-34 tables sold. He may have to borrow some tables. Everything looks good for the show.

Wade and Jack discussed that the regional trailer has been sold and it is gone.

Andy Buco gave information concerning TECO shows. The 2016 show dates were announced:

- TECO #27 will be April 23-24;
- TECO #28 will be June 18-19 (Father's Day Weekend);
- There will be no September show because of the RMR's October 2016 convention;
- TECO #29 will be December 2-4, 2016.

Joe and Kristin discussed their thinking that they will probably do the Boy Scout merit badges during the April 23-24, 2016 TECO show — and possibly during the other TECO shows.

Roy gave an award out to Ruth & Bill LaFollette for their

many years of service and dedication to TECO. Roy reports there is an upcoming meeting of the RMR 2016 Convention Board Of Directors. Roy discussed the questionnaire for the show. He has received 80 back so far. Roy also reviewed questions that he has brought up related to the convention. Negotiations are still on-going for the model car for the convention. He is looking at giving out assignments to spread the workload out. There is also work being done on signs for the convention and a quilt that will be sold.

John Emmot discussed updates for the Module Group. The next show is the October 17th for the swap meet — followed by the SlimRail show in Woodland Park. SlimRail said it will pay the Division \$100.00 for the Module Group being at this show. Wade made a motion that this \$100.00, when received, should go only to the Module Group to help pay for their costs in driving up to the show and other related expenses. The motion passed.

Tonight's contest, *Weathered Diesel Engine*, was cancelled because there were only two entries — three are required.

Mike announced that BNSF would be running a Santa Sleigh Ride Christmas train (eight or nine cars) on Friday, December 4th, 2016 for the families of Fort Carson Army Base. This passenger train is planned to be run outside the base for a couple of hours around 6-7 PM.

Discussion about the possibility of meeting presentations and videos being put on the Division website.

Meeting break at 7:48 PM.

Meeting resumed at 8:03 PM.

Raffle drawing was held.

Bob Binder gave a presentation on weathering HO-scale rolling stock.


KAILKUAU WEAIHEKIN TIPS & TECHNIQUE

BASIC INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Load Sofft Tool with color by swiping gently over pan color surface 1-3 times. Do not dig into the color. Tip: swiping too many times will generate excess dust & waste.
- Apply color to model surface achieve desired color coverage by building up layers.
- 3. Mix to create custom colors. Colors can either be mixed directly on the model surface or on a pan. Tip: if a pan's surface becomes contaminated - "clean" by gently wiping pan with a clean sponge or paper towel.
- 4. If the model will be handled frequently: "lock in" the color, if desired, by spraying with pastel fixative or a flat finish.
- 5. Color can be removed or erased prior to fixing, using a clean Sofft Sponge, an eraser, Papermate Tuf Stuff eraser or a paper towel to tone down the effect.

Cleaning Sofft Tools - the same tool can be used with multiple colors - "clean" between colors by wiping on a dry paper towel.

Important! Keep the pan's surface dry at all times - do not apply wet tools, fluids or mediums directly to the pan surface. To combine PanPastel Colors with other materials — mix together on a palette or use directly on the model.



Tips & Techniques from Prototype Modeler Rob Manley:

Surface Preparation & Finishing

- Flat finish pre-painted or decaled cars before weathering.
- A toothy, flat finish protective over-spray on the model will not cause the color to disappear, it will help protect the color. Note: models don't always need a flat over-coat, buildings, vehicles and things less handled are fine.
- My preferred flat finish is PolyScale Flat, and Model Master's Flat Acrylic. Recommended thinning is about 50/50 or thinner, it should have the viscosity of 2% milk. Liquitex Acrylic Matte Medium found in art & craft stores will work too. (I spray at 35 PSI with a Paasche H brush and a #5 tip. This tip doesn't clog as often.)
- If you don't use an airbrush, an alternative finish is Krylon workable or any pastel fixative or flat finish in a spray can.

Applying PanPastel Colors

- When applying the colors you may need to put some light (finger) pressure on the Sofft Tools to "push" the color into the surface. If the color application looks too heavy you can tone it down or remove the color easily (see below).
- Multiple colors can be loaded on one Sofft Sponge Tool, one side or the other or even the four points of the edges.
- · Light color can be laid on top of darker color.
- You can hold the model in your hand when applying.
- PanPastel Colors are dry (pastel) color. So you don't have to wait for the colors to dry.

PanPastel Color Range

The range includes pure colors, tints, shades & extra darks

Indicated by item codes as follows:

- Pure colors (xxx.5)
- Tints (xxx.7 and xxx.8) = pure colors plus white
- ▶ Shades (xxx.3) = pure colors plus black
- Extra darks (xxx.1 and xxx.2) = pure colors plus more black

Removing or Changing the Colors

- A clean Sofft Tool, and art erasers, as well as Papermate Tuff Stuff eraser pen or some paper towel can remove or tone down the color. You can also clean up lettering with an eraser.
- To start over: remove PanPastel with a toothbrush and a mild detergent (e.g. Dawn) and water.

Techniques to Try:

- To draw lines or highlight indents Use the side of a Sofft Tool. You can twist the tip of the sponge to fill in tight areas. It is also great for highlighting rods & brake lines. Try Burnt Sienna 740.5 or Red Iron Oxide Shade 380.3
- On the lower edges of ribs or frame rails use Burnt Sienna Tint 740.8 and Raw Umber Tint 780.8. Military modelers use white on panel edges to bring out details or accent wear. White would be a useful color also because Pan Pastel Colors are mixable on the model.
- Brush paint truck side frames with a #2 artist watercolor brush. It's faster than masking and firing up the airbrush. Mix PolyScale Roof Brown with Loco Black. Put a few drops on a recycled lid and partially mix the paint. This gives a more random color. Don't sandblast the trucks, just wash in Dawn. The PolyScale levels quite well and doesn't obscure details.
- To accent recessed panel lines try Black PanPastel. The residue is easier to polish off a shiny finish.
- For large vertical streaks along the panels between ribs Burnt Sienna Shade 740.3, Burnt Sienna Extra Dark 740.1, Burnt Sienna 740.5 or Red Iron Oxide Shade 380.3 are great. Raw Umber Tint 780.8 is useful for streaking the lettering. Running boards can be attacked with any of the greys.
- Add ladders, running boards and B end details after applying the colors if possible.
- For unpainted galvanized roofs brush PolyScale New Gravel or Milwaukee Road Gray between the ribs and tone it rusty with any or all of the earth / rust colors. Leave the ribs a dark or darker brown as they were steel and not galvanized. I don't start with a weathered silver painted roof because it doesn't scale down to the look of a true galvanized finish. You can also tone the BCR roof with grays to show some paint fade rather than patches.
- Masking for lines & more precise work use Post-It notes, styrene shields or Blue tape.
- When weathering wood running boards use an old business card to fit under the boards. You can get the narrow sides without getting unwanted gray on the roof.
- To apply color in tight places on a fully built car try an artist's quality oil paint brush. It should be a small #1 or 2 natural bristle. Scrub color into the tight places.
- Try other PanPastel colors for weathering think of the too red Atlas SD-24. Now use an orange shade to add fading to the paint on the body.

IMPORTANT - Don't be afraid to experiment and don't be afraid to start over! PanPastel is very forgiving. (See above for ways to start over.)

OCTOBER 2015 CONTEST ENTRIES

October's contest was *Weathered Diesel Engine*. The contest was cancelled because there were only two entries — three are required. The models that were entered are shown below.



Wade Mountz entered this set of two HO-scale, 70-ton, switch engines running in consist. These engines belong to a private railroad, the Country Boy Mine & Gravel Company. Both engines are DCC equipped and have dummy couplers on their back ends. Wade added minor weathering of rust and age.



Tony Pawlicki entered this HO-scale Santa Fe engine. This model is an upgraded Athearn "blue box" kit. Tony reports: weathering is light (these locomotives were well-maintained and only numbered 3561-3571 series briefly after acquisition from T.P.&.W. — after 14-months, there were renumbered 2370-2380). Major modifications: replaced dynamic brake with non-dynamic hood section; added low plow; added anticlimber; added second brake cylinder and bearing cover (replacing shock strut) on each side-frame; machined 45-degree corners onto rectangular "hump" forward of front exhaust stack; replaced center portions of end railings with chains; and replaced rear pilot hose boxes with grab irons to retain hoses. Minor modifications included: notched bottom corners of rear pilot; replaced cast-on solid hood lift rings with see-through brass; added under-sill-mounted bell on left side; added fuel tank gauge (right-side only); added speedometer cable (left-front); added cast-on grab irons with formed wire; added grab irons on plow top; and added front coupler lift bars and MU hoses.


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SUPERINTENDENT'S NOTES



This affords an extended opportunity to participate with our layout or the show itself. We will need to have the layout setup and running by 4:30 PM on Friday, December 4. We will probably begin setup around 11:00 AM for those who are able to start then. I expect to build a boomerang footprint for this show. I need to know who is planning to bring their modules so I can plan the placements. Please let me know at the meeting or by e-mail. I'll have a sign-up sheet for running trains at the meeting.

I never received any feedback concerning a unique shirt for the module group. We may be able to get in with the folks providing shirts for the Region Convention next fall. We need to decide if we would like to have our own identity and what logos and wording to use. Again, let me know if you are interested in pursuing this.

The SlimRail Show brought to light (pun intended) another issue for the future. Namely, illuminating fixtures over the modules. Jerry Drewes has designed and uses lights on the Pikes Peak & Southern layout. With the advent of CFLs and LEDs, which require less power, I am in favor of adding them to our setups, if the group is willing. I do not want them to be a Division responsibility. If we do it, the lights will become an owner responsibility. For consistency sake, I would like to agree on a design that all items are built to. We can have someone or a committee mass produce the number needed and provide them at a reasonable cost to those who want them. The materials include a small clamp, piece of conduit, light socket, fittings and a cord. Cost should not be excessive. Their use would also require some kind of 110 volt buss under the modules.

Origin Of Railroad Crossbuck Sign

The common railroad crossbuck sign was originally designed to look like the international skull and cross bone symbol to represent the danger of a railroad crossing. This design dates back to 1884. As shown in the photograph below, this particular castiron sign is from around 1900 and was used in Pennsylvania until sometime in the 1960's. Although this sign never carried the skull, it was added to show the historic origin of the crossbuck design. Some railroads placed images of skulls on some of the more dangerous crossing as late as the late 1800's. 
Schwanders Spur

Hello Pikes Peak Division! It's been a few months since an update so here we go again.

I used to *never ever* read articles about model railroad operations. Now, they are the first articles I read. In *Model Railroader* magazine layout articles, I'll jump to the part about operating the layout. Since deciding to run my layout with fellow operators, I am always looking for ideas to enhance my plan and make the operating sessions more interesting.

I read an article in a recent *Model Railroader* titled, "7 Ways To Add Operating Interest" by Dan Lewis. Among other ideas, the author discusses "transfer runs" and how he made a staging spur to a slightly modeled town. He runs transfer trains onto and off the spur (i.e., staging). So down to the train room I went to see how I could do the same on my layout. Once I had an idea, and because everyplace has to have a name, I'd call my spur "Schwanders Spur" The real Schwanders, Colorado (see map below) had a depot, water, and a coal platform and included a wye where trains could take one leg up to Buena Vista or continue west to St. Elmo and beyond to the Alpine Tunnel. My Schwanders is simply a town spur off the main line heading into Buena Vista.

The circle in photo 1 shows where I plan to add the spur: under the future quarry in the corner of the room. The two tracks in the foreground head to Buena Vista and in the other direction head to Denver (main staging) or Gunnison.

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The second photo is the built-up spur using scrap lumber and black card stock on the sides for tip-over protection. It's about three feet long... much longer than any train that should park on it. But I wanted plenty of extra length to account for operators stopping their trains in time (you can't see the end of it once it's installed), and for any future plans I might dream up (stage a second short train on it????).

The spur is installed in photo 3. Nothing fancy here. I added a small light overhead about halfway back. The spur sticks in there about three feet, and I clean a lot of hidden track from underneath in that corner of the layout. I made sure the spur's position did not get in the way of that tricky (read: pain in the @#\$) track cleaning. You can see there are three levels at this spot: the top level, the quarry level, and the bottom where the new spur and main line is located. Scenery will eventually hide all the holes and layout innards.

Photo 4 shows how little of the town is currently "modeled," just to make operators at least feel like they are someplace. I slid a small warehouse flat building (purchased online, downloaded, and made out of paper) on the card stock stuck to the side of the spur's plywood roadbed and glued a section of fence next to the paper structure. The tie pile tells operators where to stop safely when backing their train onto the spur.

The last photo shows operator helpers stuck to the fascia near the new staging spur. Besides a map, there's a magnet for holding card packs for trains that start or terminate on the spur.



The third item stuck to the fascia is a diagram showing the order of customers on the town spur. Early in each operating session, a transfer run departs Schwanders spur and heads to the main yard in Gunnison, with perhaps first a stop in Buena Vista to runaround, for engine service, or to swap road power. Before the end of the session, the Gunnison yardmaster builds the returning transfer train back to Schwanders. The yardmaster should build the train in the order of customers; if not, the transfer run's road crew must reorder the train before backing onto the spur.

So for the price of a turnout and one piece of track, I've added an interesting (I hope) addition to the railroad's operation and one more spot to hide a train. And when I get around to it, more challenging scenery work!

MURDOCK'S SIDING







PURPOSES & OBJECTIVES: The purposes and objectives of the Club are as follows:


- 1. To provide a meeting place for interested model railroaders;


